APG Members Asked to Show Support for the U.S. National Archives

The Advocacy Committee's Rich Venezia makes an urgent plea to members



The Advocacy Committee wishes to repeat and amplify our plea for APG members to take action in regards to the additional funding necessary for the U. S. National Archives (NARA) to continue to function.

NARA has faced decades of near-stagnant funding, preventing the agency from keeping pace with the exponential growth of archival holdings and the government's transition to digital records. This funding shortfall has led to significant operational

challenges, including inadequate staffing levels and delayed digitization efforts. NARA struggles to process the millions of cubic feet of records in its possession, and to meet the demand of serving the public. We also saw the closure of one of the regional branches (in New York City) this past year due to budget constraints.

Without additional congressional support, there is a major risk that NARA will need to take further steps to address their budget shortfall. Those steps could include reduced and restricted access to records, and in some cases, even complete closure.

Congress must plan to provide additional funding to NARA instead of passing the buck year to year from Continuing Resolution to Continuing Resolution. NARA needs this infusion of funding so that the agency can address critical challenges; expand its workforce; enhance agency record-keeping oversight; improve technological capabilities; and accelerate mass digitization efforts, ensuring that historical records are preserved and accessible for future generations. In other words, the agency would finally be able to accomplish its statutory mission-critical obligations.

We implore our US-based members to contact their elected officials to discuss the importance of additional funding to NARA. NARA is on life support and needs our help. Members of Congress almost never hear about the National Archives, so even a few phone calls can make a significant difference. Our elected officials only know about what's important to us if we tell them! Another advocacy alert relates to New York State vital records. Anyone who has worked with NY records knows of the extremely long wait times for genealogical requests (going on five years when requested from the state!). The state is now proposing that genealogical records access be amended as follows—births from 75 years to 125 years (when the person is known to be deceased), marriages from 50 years to 100 years (when both spouses are known to be deceased), and deaths from 50 years to 75 years. They are also proposing an hourly fee for genealogical research, in addition to a 50% increase on how much the records cost now. If this is passed, this would SEVERELY limit access to New York state vital records. Most individuals are not eligible for certified records of their deceased parents without a court order, and so would have to request them when the genealogical timeframe had passed. Now that timeframe is set to increase by decades—meaning someone with a parent born in New York State would NEVER be able to see their parent's birth record without a court order... unless that individual lived to 125. The New York Genealogical & Biographical Society has put together a website with more information on how you can take action here: https://www.newyorkfamilyhistory.org/ blog/call-action-regarding-access-new-york-state-vital-records. The hearing for this proposed legislation is on 11 February, so don't delay!

The Association of Professional Genealogists (APG) has announced that its President, John Boeren, QG, has resigned from his position on the APG Board of Directors for personal reasons. "I am confident that the association will continue to thrive, and I look forward to seeing the great work it will accomplish in the future," said Boeren. "Thank you for your understanding and for the opportunity to contribute to such passionate and dedicated teams."

In such circumstances, APG's Bylaws (https://www.apgen.org/bylaws.php) note under Article VI, Section 2B, that "The Vice President shall ... Assume the office and duties of the President for the remaining term in the event of a vacancy in the office of President." As such, the organization's Vice President, Suzanne L. Hoffman, of Chicago, Illinois, USA, has now succeeded John to serve out his remaining term (through 2025).



Also known as "The Genealogy Maven," Suzanne has worked as a professional forensic genealogist for the past seven years, and is also a specialist in Eastern European research and immigration. She holds certificates of completion from the Boston University Genealogical Research program, ProGen, GenProof, GenFed, Forensic Genealogy I and II from the Genealogical Research Institute of Pittsburgh (GRIP), and various other courses. Suzanne also volunteers at the Wilmette (Illinois) FamilySearch Center, is the current president of the APG Forensic Genealogy Special Interest Group, an APG representative to the Record Preservation and Access Coalition, Secretary of the Illinois State Genealogical Society, and Chair of its Advocacy Committee.

Commenting on the situation, Suzanne has paid tribute to outgoing president John Boeren's work whilst in office at the organization. "I want to thank John for all he has done to support APG over the past five years, as both a board member and as President. He has changed APG for the better."

Assuming the Vice President role is APG board member Karin Coppernoll of Washington, USA. Karin is a professional genealogist with a particular interest in DNA, land records, New York State, and the Northwest Region of the USA. She holds a Certificate in Genealogical Research from Boston University, a Professional Learning Certificate in Genealogical Studies from The National Institute for Genealogical Studies, and has completed in-person and virtual advanced courses through the Salt Lake Institute of



Genealogy. Currently the Chair of APG's On-Ramp Committee, Karin has served in leadership roles in APG's Puget Sound Chapter, the Washington State Genealogical Society, and the Monroe (Washington) Historical Society.



apg FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR Michelle Dwyer Cohen



APG's goals include engaging in and advocating for activities that preserve, improve access to, and facilitate research in records used in the fields of genealogy and local history, as well as promoting awareness of activities and laws that may affect our research. Across the globe, genealogists must always be aware of what's happening with their local records, and laws which might impact access to them.

In the past few years, we can claim some victories. The UK has just reversed its decision to destroy original English and Welsh wills (see p.2), while U.S. Citizen and Immigration Services has not only reversed course on proposed fee increases for historical records, it has reduced its fees to approximately where they were in 2008!

We can only be successful with these campaigns when 1) we are aware that there is a threat to existing records, or access to them, 2) we can combine forces with other genealogical organizations with similar concerns, and 3) when we can mobilize our constituents into action, by contacting elected officials, and/or by submitting public comments.

As governments struggle with so many financial priorities, we must remain vigilant. As such, APG operates both an Advocacy committee and an Advocacy Special Interest Group. In the United States, we also participate in the Records Preservation Access Coalition. On 9 April 2025, we plan on active participation in Hill Day, an opportunity for genealogists to work together to present our concerns to legislators. The main idea for this Hill Day is to focus on continued support and funding for the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA).

For members outside the United States, APG would like to know more about when, where, and how we can provide support. And if you have an issue that you would wish to fight for, there are many ways to get involved. Contact your representatives. Share relevant posts on social media. Be an advocate for access and preservation at your local genealogical society—we need to make sure the public knows what can happen if we don't speak out.

I am explaining all this because when we ask members to contact their local representatives, it's important to do so. Please do take these requests seriously; and more importantly, please **take action**!


